HEADCORN ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2016

Minutes of the Annual Parish meeting held on 21st April 2016 at 8.00p.m in the Village Hall, Longmeadow.

Cllr Lyn Selby presided and there were 67 present, including Parish Councillors and Kent County Councillor Jenny Whittle

Apologies were received from Cllr John Crawford & Cllr Dave Andrews.

1. Introduction

Cllr Selby opened the meeting and warmly welcomed all attending. Thanks were noted to Sainsbury's Local for once again providing refreshments for this evening.

2. Minutes

The Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of the 23rd April 2015 were approved.

It was noted that there would be a change in the order of the agenda as we waited for the meeting to be joined by KCC Councillor Jenny Whittle.

3. Annual Report of the Parish Council by the Chair

Last year I began my report with the words "At the risk of repeating myself, I have to tell you that for the third year running we have been very busy and also we are busier than ever" All I can say today is that the same statement applies to the year that has passed since we were last here.

By far the most time consuming issue has been planning - in all its various forms and with all its various frustrations, but our Open Spaces Committee has been busy too and over the year we have managed to bring into being across the board various ideas which have been developing over previous years.

More of these later, but I will begin with "monster" that is Planning!

Planning Committee

Headcorn Parish Council has, like all Parish Councils, a statutory right to be consulted on all planning applications relating to this parish. We have to carefully consider and reply to Maidstone Borough Planning Department within limited time scales and since last May we have considered 101 Planning Applications, many of them very complex, in particular the many from developers seeking to build large numbers of houses.

To process this high number and fit into the timescales, the Planning Committee has continued to meet twice a month, and due to business and health reasons, Cllr Dungy and Cllr Pyman have together covered the roles of Chair and Vice Chair of this committee over the year.

Many of the major issues facing the Planning Committee that I mentioned in my report last year have still been around this past year – I will not repeat my words as to the Parish Council's views on these subjects as they recorded in last year's Minutes. However to update you on the issues:-

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Solar Farms – the proposed solar farm at Tong reappeared and has been refused by Maidstone Borough Council following opposition from HPC and Ulcombe PC also the CPRE. The Pullen Farm proposal has also been refused.

Our general thoughts about solar farms have been along the lines - why are the solar panels not being put on all the new housing and on existing industrial and similar buildings rather than on green field sites.

Maidstone Local Plan The latest consultation on this much delayed plan has just finished and we await further progress following the Borough Council elections on May 5th.

Unfortunately, the delay in producing this plan, largely brought about by MBC's decision to concentrate on opposing KIG some years back and therefore to put the Local Plan on hold, has had significant effects on this Parish. The lack of a MBC Local Plan combined with the Government's demand for an identified 5 year housing land supply has resulted in the developers being allowed to run riot over green fields in this and other parishes in the borough.

Gypsy and Traveller Sites

We continue to have applications regarding these sites, whether for a new site, an increase in the number of mobile homes on a site or changes in the family named on the planning permission. HPC continues to believe that Headcorn has more than its fair share of such sites. Recently the Government has sought to level the planning playing field regarding these sites as it was widely perceived as unfair that the occupants of these sites had more planning rights than the general public. However, it is felt by many parishes that MBC has taken a weak approach towards the new legislation. MBC have agreed to produce for HP a site plan of all the sites they are aware of in the parish – however, only a rough drawing of the Lenham Road sites has been produced so far and we continue to chase them on this matter.

Housing Developments

We have continued to receive planning applications for large development on green field sites around the village. A large amount of Cllrs time and efforts have been spent on trying to contain these developments. We are firmly of the opinion that Headcorn must grow to survive, but at the right pace, in the right place and when the right infrastructure is in place. In 2011 this village had around 1100 dwellings – if all the developers currently surrounding the village are allowed to have their way there will be around 700 more houses added to this number over the next few years -over 50% more the vast majority on greenfield sites. Cllrs have spent many hours discussing issues with MBC Planning Officers and lobbying MBC Councillors on their Planning Committee. We have raised points where their practise seems shaky and inconsistent and made complaints when needed. We have asked the Secretary of State to intervene and our MP has been involved, as has Jenny Whittle our KCC Cllr. Our main concern has been the plan for 220 houses behind Mill Bank exiting onto Ulcombe Road, some two and half times the largest previous development in the village. Led by Cllr Crawford we prepared and put forward a very strong case for refusal at a Public Enquiry held (at HPC request, so parishioners could attend) in Headcorn -many thanks to those parishioners who supported us on the day. Unfortunately, due to the quirks of the planning system, the developers obtained permission under another application and so the Inspector's recommendation was never made public! However, many thanks to Cllr Crawford for his extensive work on this enquiry.

As a last resort HPC took legal advice and has taken legal action in an attempt to prevent this enormous development which will change this village in so many ways. This action is still in progress at the current time. It is unfortunate Maidstone Borough Council have the final say

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on planning applications and they are a very urban biased council, with it seems, the majority of Cllrs having very little idea of rural communities. Many of the other Parish Councils in the Borough also feel this is an issue. Cllr Round, who is now also a MBC Cllr and Borough Cllr Richard Thick have joined and other Cllrs from rural wards to form a cross party group to try put forward the rural position and HPC has fully supported them in this endeavour. However, HPC do have their successes – in the past month, our challenge of inconsistency and inaccuracies in the Planning Officers report combined with lobbying of the MBC Cllrs led to the refusal of yet another 60 or so houses on the Lenham Road.

Moving on but not away from Planning, an update on our Neighbourhood Plan This has been a major undertaking for this council and has taken years to produce and jump through all the various hoops required.

It has been though its final consultation period and any adjustments needed were made. Currently it is with the Independent Examiner, from which after progressing through MBC it would go to a Parish Referendum. We had hoped to bring you the result of the examination and so give some idea of the date of the referendum, but it is still currently with the examiner. But, and here we go again, this would not have been so if MBC had not unacceptably delayed the final consultation -for which the Head Planner apologised! Cllr Dave Andrews has been the lead Cllr on this project and I know he would wish me to thank publicly all the volunteers who have worked to help with it over the years.

We must mention by name however, those volunteers who have been involved in the past 2years, meeting nearly every Tuesday evening, who have worked with us to bring it to its current state. Rebecca Driver and Michael Jefferies who between them wrote the plan, Hilary Hosford, Chris Haynes, James Ker and Tim Thomas who helped us to inform the plan and iron out the creases. Without their immense input we would not have been able to complete it. And they are still with us, waiting in case needed after the examination -thank to all of them. And of course a special thanks go to Dave for all his hard work on this project. Enough of planning and related issues.

Open Spaces Committee

The remit of this committee is to make sure our village remains an attractive, clean and welcoming place, both for the Headcorn Parishioners, and also the tourists and shoppers from nearby villages, without which our High Street would not thrive. During the year, Cllr Fox left the HPC for personal and business reasons. His place as Chair of this committee has been ably filled by Cllr James and Cllr Lewer has acted as Vice Chair.

A list of all the many main issues supervised by the Open Spaces Committee is in last year's minutes, but to bring up to date some of the items covered by the Cllrs this year as follows:-

Our Village Lengthsmen.

You may notice the plural there! For some 18years Alan Hodge has worked very hard to cover the areas that MBC cleaners and grass cutters do not reach -and as you would expect, there are many such areas.

Our thanks to Alan for all his continuing hard work. During these eighteen years the village has grown, and Open Spaces have tried to think of the best way to help Alan, we think, in fact we are sure, we have finally found the answer - that is Malcolm Hitchcock who joined us in November as an assistant to Alan and together they have worked wonders around the village, cleaning, clearing and doing odd maintenance jobs.

Welcome Malcolm and thanks to you too.

A massive clear out of the village store which amongst other stuff also houses Alan and Malcolm's tools etc., revealed a hand wash basin and a very usable size long worktop/shelf

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that was frankly lethal. OS agreed to facilitate the use of the wash basin, replace the worktop/shelf with a new safe variety and is considering a new, brighter light to relieve the gloom in there. Hopefully we can in future store the play scheme equipment and other items more tidily and it will be a more pleasant place for our lengthsman to return at the end of their day.

Street Lighting

We are continuing our programme of upgrading the parish owned lighting both to improve the quality of the light each standard provides and also to reduce the energy used by using more modern equipment. You may have noticed that the old leaning concrete post on Forge Lane next to the new houses has been replaced by a smart new one -this was part of the Parishes project -not the developers as my husband told me the other day!

Cllr Mather has been overseeing this project for OS -thanks John.

In addition, the computer software known as D light is now up and running which makes it easier for the reporting and monitoring of lighting faults.

Burial Ground

We have continued to try and keep this as a special place for those who have been bereaved by asking our lengthsman to clear out and revamp the back corner where the dead flowers etc are placed. Also, with 2 lengthsman we stand some chance of keeping up with the grass and weed explosion when summer finally arrives. To assist all using the path but especially for the burial parties using Parsonage Meadow as car park or moving from the church to the burial ground, we have replaced the stile near the church with a kissing gate and both the area under this gate and under the gate to the burial ground have had a firm new surfaces. The undertakers of course still continue to contact our Clerk as to the next plot to be used etc.

Play Ground

By chance, it came to the notice of some Cllrs that moneys from developers as a result of S106 planning agreements with MBC were still sitting with MBC and had not been used to Headcorn's advantage. Some detective work by our Clerk resulted in MBC agreeing to thousands of pounds being used for renewing our children's playground on the village green. A small sub group are consulting and planning new equipment for this area and will be reporting to the next OS Meeting. The OS have also agreed to Blooming Headcorn volunteers plating bulbs and generally cheering up the green around this area, Christmas Lights We hope that we have finally after many attempts sorted the tree near the lych gate. Mainly the lights ran without problems this year. A new light was added to brighten the tree in Foreman's Walk. The programme is nearing completion but we hear that there will be another "Illuminating Quiz" in the near future, so our thanks again to the Dungey family for all of the funds they have raised for the project.

I could continue for much longer regarding the work of the O S Committee -but suffice it to say that most things you will notice around the village will have come to the notice and hence the plans of this committee.

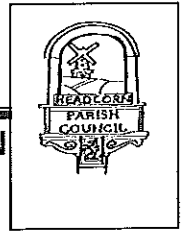
Toilets

You may have noticed that we have been having problems with the toilet block which has been frequently shut. Apart from vandalism which unfortunately is a recurrent challenge coming in a waves from time to time, we have had issues with parts not being readily

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available for the new equipment installed some 2years ago. We are also currently discussing a new cleaning regime which will hopefully deal with any problems over the weekdays, but still need to find a solution for the weekends when, especially during the Spring and Summer months the green is frequently in use.

Staffing Committee

This Committee continues to meet as and when required, chaired by Cllr James. Its embers monitor the work of the Clerk who in turn monitors the lengthsman as one of her many roles.

This is the last of our formal Committees, but many Cllrs have been involved with working groups set up for specific purposes.

Playscheme Group

This as its name implies, runs the Annual Play scheme. A Playscheme was run again in the village school in summer 2015. The children, parents and Cllrs involved feel it was very successful. Unfortunately, OFSTED did not -not because of the facilities, activities etc. provided but overwhelmingly because of the paperwork not being readily available and because we did not have a development programme for our play assistants who worked for us for a maximum of 42hours each and were all highly experienced in child care/ teaching already!

Our Clerk has worked with KCC to make sure that our paperwork is excellent for this coming year. Nothing to do with OFSTED, but we have also had a long overdue, massive clear out and cataloguing of all our materials and apparatus so that in future we know what we have and what needs reordering.

Unfortunately, our premises, the school, will not be available this year due to the planned start of building for the much needed school expansion! We have considered other sites but do not feel they would meet current day requirements. So no Playscheme in 2016 but we are all ready for 2017!

Communications Group

This Group led by Cllr Dungey has masterminded the setup of a new HPC website – the previous website was based on the old KCC provision for parish councils and was very limited and difficult to update. The new site is about to go live I understand. Many thanks must go to volunteer Davyd Nash who has given many hours to this project and I understand a Simon Selby was also helpful. The Group also liaise with Jane Armstrong who set up and runs the Village Website which is sponsored by the HPC. Thanks to Jane also.

On the recommendation of this group, the HPC s noticeboards on Foreman's Walk have been revamped and replaced and a board is now out Hawkenbury.

Other working groups include the Finance Group, which meets when necessary, most notably to propose the budget and a precept for the following year.

Also Special events group – springs to life when needed -thanks to them for arranging the refreshments for tonight.

Finally The Remembrance Day Group which organises the RD Parade -a massive task as the British Legion no longer involved and the Police will no longer help.

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Thanks to the Group for the Spitfires again this year and the pilot assures me that the poppies will hit the centre of the parade on the third time – wind permitting!

Parish Surgeries

Due to the success of the Clerk being in the Parish Office where parishioners can contact her especially during the open hours, it was decided to stop the Saturday morning surgeries where attendance by parishioners had dropped to zero on several occasions. If someone wishes to speak to a Cllr instead of the Clerk, Caroline will be happy to arrange an appointment.

Speedwatch

Cllr Sally Lewer has continued to organise volunteers and the rota and liaise with the Police regarding this service which seeks to educate the drivers to watch their speed through the village. It is a County wide scheme and we are told it does have results, which are not always apparent to the volunteers standing by the roadside. As speeding is a frequent complaint of residents, I hope more will volunteer to man the Speedwatch equipment - our numbers are depleted and the more we have the more the impact.

CCTV

Due to the number of antisocial behaviour incidents it has been agreed to add to our existing camera in the High Street. One more camera has been purchased and another is coming in the 2016-2017 financial year as part of the same package.

Oak Lane

Parking in this lane has been a running challenge throughout the year. The worst offenders we believe are commuters. We have been pressurising MBC and now have agreement that they support our plea for parking restriction (of the ½ hour prohibited style as in other parts of the village) However, there are processes to go through and the legal dept will only put out for consultation large numbers of such restrictions at particular times of the year. These will not be advertised until mid-summer. In the meantime, Wealden Homes have assured us they will start building the pavement (part of their planning consent) from Grigg Lane to opposite Knave's Acre as soon as MBC's legal department sign the relevant form.

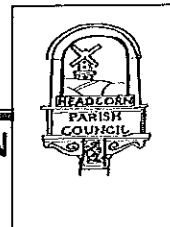
There are many other issues I could report to you – but enough is enough -if I have missed something you were waiting to hear please feel free to ask questions.

Finally – this is the last Annual Parish Council Meeting before the Elections on May 5th. As your most immediate branch of local government, HPC was up for election this year -but you will not have to vote! Sadly it was an uncontested election as there are 13 persons standing for 13 places. There were 19 Parish Councils up for election in Maidstone Borough and only 2 are contested. It is a sad reflection of modern life that people with skills and local knowledge do not have the time, or in some cases the interest to come forward for election. Four years ago, all the Cllrs met together and agreed that we wanted during the next 4 years to be an approachable, professional and modern parish council. We may not be quite there yet but we have come a long way towards it with the Parish Office, the new computer systems and a general sort out of papers and possessions. Hopefully this will continue with the new council.

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Over the past 4 years we have lost a number of Cllrs who due to the pressure of family, health issues or work have not felt able to continue with the demands of the modern parish council. Unfortunately, due mainly to those same pressures, five Cllrs have not stood for re-election. Cllrs Henderson and Cllr Lewer (who has worked with us for 8yrs) are leaving us to spend more time with their families and in Cllr Henderson case, his minister! He assures us he will be back.

Unfortunately, Cllr Kemp who has worked with us on and off over a number of 4 year periods is retiring due to ill health but hopes to return. Cllr Crawford is now living in Tenterden and finally Cllr Martin Round who has for the last 2 years had 2 hats as HPC and MBC Cllr whilst coping with his own and his mother's ill health, has decided to concentrate on leading the rural fight against MBC's urban Cllrs. We know he will still work closely with HPC. I hope the new Cllrs are aware of the standard they need at which they need to aim! Considering the past 4 years, I should like to thank our previous Clerk. Helen Anderson for her input during the first two years.

Our current Clerk Caroline Carmichael has successfully coped with the change from the instant results of the business world to vagaries and elongated processes of the world of Local Government. She has made herself well known to parishioners as someone who is there to help or point them in the right direction when they have a problem. Caroline is the smiling face of the Council! Many thanks to her for all her hard work and support.

Finally, and I should again like to thank all the Cllrs for their hard work and support -in particular Chairs and Vice Chairs and leaders of working groups, but especially our Vice Chairman Bridget Dungey who "stepped up to the plate" when the position became vacant and, despite several stays in hospital has been a source of support and advice. So can I ask you to please join with me and show your thanks to them for their commitment to Headcorn in the usual way.

Cllr Dungey gave a vote of thanks to the Chair, Cllr Selby, for all her tireless work over the last four years.

4. **Kent County Councillor Jenny Whittle** addressed the meeting and she began by thanking the Chair, Clerk and Council for their hard work and support. She further reported that she was aware that at last year's meeting she had committed to a highways mirror on the Smarden Road. After consultation with Kent Highways the site has deemed not a viable place for a mirror and the other schemes they suggested are excessive in costs and given that Jenny has a highways fund of just £20,000 (for a number of parishes) these are not possible. Cllr Whittle talked of the expansion of Headcorn Primary which must be seen as excellent news and should enable more local children to attend the village school. The expansion over the next few years will mean that ultimately there are two classes in each year. She was happy to report the success with the traffic measures introduced on Mill Bank. Cllr Whittle reported that she had a deep frustration with MBC Local Plan and why the plan was not developed in consultation with the parishes and the housing requirement spread evenly across the parishes, rather than concentrated on just a few. It is now up to KCC to strongly oppose the local plan due to the significant highways infrastructure issues and they must "up the anti" at a public enquiry into the plan.

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Cllr Whittle continues to press the matter with Highways regarding the traffic marking required at Shenley Corner.

The Cllr will be chairing a select committee that will focus on securing grammar school places for pupils from the community that would not ordinarily be offered places.

There continue to be significant pressures on budgets, not least of all the issues of unaccompanied minors & the needs of the elderly.

These pressures resulted in an increase in Council Tax of 4%, the first increase in a number of years.

Cllr Kemp asked Cllr Whittle about the difference in opinion on the number of houses required between MBC and KCC, Cllr Whittle agreed that it was a very difficult situation and confirmed that KCC feel that the number should be circa 15,000 and hopes that the MBC numbers will be over turned at public enquiry.

Cllr Kemp noted that it is a sad state of affairs that the two principal authorities could not agree on these matters.

Lastly Cllr Whittle thanked the Parish Council for their hard work and confirmed that she would continue to do all she could to support the parishes.

5. **Kent Police** – PCSO John Boyd was unable to join us at the meeting and sent the following address, which was read by Cllr Dungey:-

Headcorn has maintained a low level of crime during the past year. I cannot access any data on crime statistics internally any more, However going by the monthly crimes I report for the parish meetings we are sustaining the reduced level of crime we have benefited from during the past few years. This has been possible through the support of the community and the Parish Council. We have dealt with a number of issues throughout the year, which have included the following:

- Follow ups on the victims of burglaries/breaks to give crime prevention advice and information booklets.
- Speed enforcement checks and speed monitoring checks throughout the village and surrounding area.
- Continued support throughout the year to various local groups and activities
- Patrols of outlying areas to deter and stop vehicles known for scrap metal thefts. This has been backed up with pre-arranged Policing Operations County wide involving numerous authorities and scrap yard inspections.
- The parish CCTV cameras have been used to great effect this year in detection and prevention of crime. These cameras have had a positive effect on reducing crime and nuisance in the area and are an excellent tool for me to use/ promote and educate with.
- The mobile police station still comes to the village every 2 weeks and parks in car park for residents to discuss any issues they have and I still run my surgeries at different venues around the village on a monthly basis.
- It would be great if we could get some Neighbourhood watch organised and set up for the area. If we could get a co-ordinator arranged I would very much like to get involved and help organise.

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We are always trying to keep on top of any nuisance youth issues in the village. As with the previous year this has also not been a major issue this year and any incidents of this type of behaviour have been swiftly dealt with to good effect. We encourage residents to call in any incidents of this type of nuisance behaviour.

PCSO Siobhan de Burca-Ousby sends her best wishes to the Parish Council and all the residents. She has been working with myself since her return from maternity leave in April 2015 and has assisted me in establishing links within the community. She wishes to let you all know that she will be taking leave in July 2016 for a few months and will link back in with myself on her return.

Anyone wishing to contact me about any issues or crime prevention advice can call the non-emergency Police number 101.

Thank you for your continued support in making Headcorn safe.

Kent Community Warden – A written report was received and was read out by Cllr Dungey and is as follows:-

I would first like to send my apologies for my non-attendance tonight. My Supervisor is working a late shift this week, which transpires that I work early shifts to take the incoming calls as part of my Deputy Team Leader role.

I'm often asked: "What is your Job description?"

It's one of the most difficult questions to answer. In fact, it's almost impossible to quantify!

'We wear many hats' in our role as a KCC Community Warden. We will play the part of a trusted friend, a mediator, a care-giver, a relayor of information, a networker – the list is almost infinite.

The list gets bigger each year as we face further challenges with other agencies having to reduce their manpower. We have had to pick up new skills to deal with these challenges – effectively; my 'hat' collection has grown!

As I highlighted in last year's report 'Partnerships' were the most important part of my role here in Headcorn. We are only as strong as our partnerships allow us to be.

I am very lucky to have a great partnership with the Parish Council here in Headcorn. I have always felt fully supported by them – not only when my Job was under threat, but also with the challenges of my new role as Deputy Team Leader for the Maidstone, Tonbridge and Malling Team. The Parish Council have been very understanding from the beginning since I haven't been able to attend many meetings this year due to the constraints of my role.

I would like to give a special thanks to Caroline, the Parish Clerk. Caroline has been a breath of fresh air and has been incredibly supportive to both myself and PCSO Boyd. She wears her

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heart on her sleeve when it comes to the Village. We have a great working relationship and I believe many of my colleagues in other Parishes are quite envious of this.

Headcorn is at the forefront of my mind – I have had a family connection with the Village that dates back many years – it is a spiritual home from home when I come to work. Headcorn is a highly diverse community that does indeed throw up new challenges on a daily basis. It's a changing community, and will continue to do so as the future progresses.

What is important is that the community here remains a strong one in wake of any infrastructure change or population increase. From what is evident already, there is a community here that does want to achieve what is best for its residents, and for its traditions. It is clear that Headcorn's population will speak up, when their traditions or community ethos are threatened by changes. I view this as a passionate love for their Village – something that has been lost in other communities.

I do not want to be seen to waffle on about Networks, challenges or changes, but what would be fantastic to see is everybody supporting one another in bringing together a positive future for Headcorn. I think we all spend too much time worrying about the negatives. I think the future could be bright indeed. Not only for this generation, but also for future generations to come.

Some of the bigger projects this year have locally have seen me help set up some useful networks. Exciting things are taking place.

It was brilliant to be part of the High Street foray into the Victorian themed Christmas – let's hope this goes from strength to strength.

I am hoping to support Laura Pearson in setting up a Dementia Community for the Village with help from the Parish and the Traders in making Headcorn a more Dementia friendly environment.

I am also helping set up a regular NHS health walks scheme for the Headcorn area with local resident – Barry Walker. I believe this social and healthy experience will begin on the 10th May – please look out for the posters-why don't you join us?!

I have also helped introduce IPAD training into resident's homes that are housebound via the KCC library service. This is a positive skill enabling residents to use the technology to hire on-line books, (if they can't get to the library) use email, or even take a virtual walk into the Village via Google Earth!

On the serious front I will continue to engage with my agency colleagues from Kent Police, the local Borough Councillors, KCC and Social Services, Trading Standards and many others. Most importantly I will continue to engage with the residents of Headcorn. Without you I wouldn't have this fantastic role.

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It has been a busy year for the KCC Community Warden Service in many ways with networks and changes constantly evolving the way we work. We have had to change the way we deal with county emergencies with such events as 'Operation Stack' where we at the forefront of humanitarian aid to the thousands of trapped drivers on the M20.

We are also continuing to go around the county and visit those that have been victims of Scams and Scam mail. We are working from a list that was intercepted by Trading Standards and have been carrying out assessments on over two thousand victims across Kent.

I think my skills 'hat' collection is getting bigger by the day. If anyone wishes to lend me one in the summer to stop my head from catching too much sun, then please feel free to get in contact!

Once again, many apologies for not being here tonight. I hope you have an enjoyable AGM and look forward to seeing you all on the streets of Headcorn.
